Mission

Salem Academy Charter School is an independent, public school serving the diverse population of Salem with a college preparatory program for students in grades six through twelve. Through a unique integration of college preparatory classes with service to the community, the school graduates informed, articulate, and proactive individuals of strong character.

City and School Information

Salem Academy Charter School is a public school, chartered by the Massachusetts Department of Elementary and Secondary Education under the 1993 Education Reform Act. The school opened its doors to sixth and seventh graders in September 2004, graduated its first class in 2009, and has grown to 420 students. All students are challenged with rigorous college preparatory classes, engage in enrichment activities and classes, and apply their learning through service in the community. Salem Massachusetts has a population of 42,219 and median household income of \$57,400; 88% are high school graduates; 37.9% are college graduates (bachelor's degree or higher).

Service Learning

Each year students in grades 6 to 12 engage in service work tied to academic skills. Students are required to write a senior thesis on an issue of their choice, develop an action plan to address the problem that they have researched, and to serve at least 50 hours of direct service, advocacy and leadership toward their cause.

Graduation Requirements

Salem Academy recommends that students earn credits in all five core academic subjects each year. Students are required to earn 66 credits out of a maximum of 78 credits over four years. One full-year equivalent course yields 3 credits.

Course Grades

At Salem Academy, students complete a rigorous, standards-based, college preparatory program in order to graduate. In each course, students are assessed solely on their achievement of the academic standards. Instead of assigning traditional letter or percentage grades, Salem Academy assesses students on an internal proficiency scale of 1 to 4 based on their progress toward specific objectives within each course.

Grade Point Average

Salem Academy uses a weighted GPA. Honors courses are weighted an additional 0.5 points and Advanced Placement an additional 1.0 points more than traditional classes. While Salem Academy does not use traditional letter grades, we do provide a conversion to letter grades with our GPA conversion chart below. We hold our students to a very high bar and therefore do not award GPA credit for grades below a "traditional C" at Salem Academy. We ask colleges to support us in holding our students to this high level of academic rigor by NOT equating our passing grade to anything less than what is noted below. It is not accurate to equate our passing grade to a D- on a traditional scale.

Passing Grade Beginning in 2015-16

Beginning this year, in order to receive credit for a course, students must demonstrate that they are proficient by averaging a 3 or higher on their standards for that course. We believe that this method of calculating course grades is more rigorous and will therefore better prepare students for the demands of college.
